French also uses the verb "aller" (to go) for the future.

Here's how it works:

- you need a subject (someone /something to do the action)
- the form of "aller" that goes with the subject
- another verb in its **infinitive** form (that means its original form ; you don't remove endings like —er, ir, re)

You'll need to learn these:

ALLER

Je vais = I go / I'm going
Tu vas = You go / You're going
Il va = He goes / He's going
Elle va = She goes / She's going

Nous **allons** = We go / We're going Vous **allez** = You go / You're going Ils **vont** = They go / They're going Elles **vont** = They go / They're going

Here are a few examples:

Je vais parler à mon père = I am going to speak to my father.

Tu vas regarder le film . = You are going to watch the film.

Il va faire une pizza = He is going to make a pizza.

Elles vont aider . = They (f) are going to help.

To say that something is **not going to happen,** you use "ne....pas".

You put the **ne** before the form of "aller" and the **pas** after.

Example: Je **ne** vais **pas danser.** = I am not going to dance.
