## Les pronoms démonstratifs Unité 2

If you want to say "this / these" in French, you'll need to learn a few terms.

First, you need to consider if what you're talking about is masculine, feminine, or plural.

\* If the thing you refer to is <u>masculine</u>, you use the word "Ce".

Ex.  $\underline{Ce}$  film est bon. =  $\underline{This}$  film is good.

• If the word is masculine, **BUT** starts with a vowel or silent "h", you use the term "**Cet**".

Ex. Cet homme est pratique. = This man is practical.

If you refer to a feminine word, you say "Cette".

Ex. *Cette* chemise est terrible. = This shirt is terrible.

\* OK. Now for something <u>wicked important</u>! If you refer to more than one thing, you ALWAYS use the term "*Ces*" to say 'these'. It doesn't matter if the things are masculine or feminine, use "ces" <u>anytime you refer to more than one thing to say 'these'</u>.

Ex. *Ces* films sont bons. = These films are good.

*Ces* chemises sont terribles. = These shirts are terrible.

Here's *approximately* how they are pronounced:

Ce [suh], cet [set], cette [set], ces [say]
